BlondeMoney View

- The EU is unsurprisingly preparing a hard-line approach to Phase 2 talks. Extending EU citizens' rights until 2020, supervised by the ECJ, might be tough for Brexiteers to swallow, as by that stage it will be over four years since they voted to take back control. Then Norway pops up to suggest their EU arrangement might have to change if the UK receives anything special. BoJo is in despair: he would vote Remain if he knew we had to accept a Norway style time pressured deal. Theresa May's speech in Feb to outline her govt's Brexit plan cannot come quickly enough to get everyone in line and on the same page. Meanwhile on the home front, Britain's second largest construction firm, Carillion, just entered liquidation, impacting people up and down the country how will an unstable and divided Tory Cabinet deal with another crisis?
- Trump, fresh from his stable genius success of tax cuts, is now using the Congressional spat over government funding to press on with plans for his precious Wall. With a deadline of midnight Friday, will another temporary "continuing resolution" be passed, the fourth of this federal fiscal year? The atmosphere is poisonous, with the Democrats keen for a deal that includes DACA. The global view of Trump may be distracted by gossipy sideshows but the debate with the WSJ over whether he said 'I have' or 'I'd have [a good relationship with the N Korean leader]' masks the reality that the two Koreas are now talking. Never underestimate a man with momentum.
- Hitting new lows in the polls might be reason enough for SPD grassroot members to vote for the Grand Coalition on Jan 21st. If they don't, their party could face an even worse fate, should new elections be called. At that point either the CDU or SPD could face a defenestration of their leader, in order to present a fresh alternative to the electorate. Angela and Martin will be having sleepless nights. If the Grand Coalition fails, they may try and scrabble together a confidence-and-supply agreement rather than go to elections; if the GC is voted through, they then face ruling with divisions within their own parties let alone the electorate.


