- Rees-Mogg's Eurosceptic ERG to write <u>their own Brexit 'White Paper'</u>; moderate Brexiteer and Remainer MPs form <u>'Brexit Delivery Group'</u> aiming on "*pragmatic Brexit outcome*"
- Pres Trump authorises additional sanctions to <u>Russia</u> and <u>Turkey</u>
- Germany Chlr Merkel and Spain PM Sanchez reach new migration agreement

BlondeMoney View

- Parliamentary support for UK PM May's Chequers Proposal is waning. The influential pro-Brexit ERG, led by Rees-Mogg and Vote Leave leader Baker, have announced that they are writing an alternative "positive" Brexit White Paper. It will explain how the UK can have a Canada-style free trade deal and demand the EU back down on the Irish border issue. 'No Deal' will also be outlined, which the ERG think "would be a good second best". In response 50 moderate Brexiteers and pro-Europe MPs have announced their own parliamentary group. The 'Brexit Delivery Group' seeks a "pragmatic Brexit outcome" namely avoid No Deal. Including the pro-Remain cross-party People's Vote group, there are now 3 major factions within the Conservative Party fighting for different outcomes. TM is trying to shore up her position as leader, sending a letter to grassroots Tory organisations. As BlondeMoney has said before, public opinion is key for a minority administration: a recent analysis of YouGov data suggested that over 100 'Leave' constituencies have swung and would now vote Remain. If true, the 'moderate-Remainer' faction could gain momentum, but that will just make the No Deal noise louder. The markets will eventually force someone to deal their hand.
- Pres Trump continues to ramp up his trade rhetoric ahead of midterms in November. Following his political faux-pas with Putin in Helsinki, the State Department announced that Moscow had a hand in the Novichok poisoning and that they would put a bill to Congress which would increase the sanctions on Russia. Russia PM Medvedev responded: "that's a declaration of economic war", DJT knows this show of strength plays well with his Republican voter base. The Donald also aimed his twitter gun at embattled Turkey Pres Erdogan: only a few minutes after USD/TRY hit 7.0000, he announced a doubling on metal tariffs for Turkey unless American pastor Brunson was freed. Brunson has been incarcerated in Turkey for over 2 years and has not lived in the US for over 20 years raising questions over DJT's sudden urgency. The inevitable firing of FBI agent Strzok also provided material for the White House to push their 'it-is-us-versus-the-media' agenda. Expect Trump to line up the enemies to keep his momentum going.
- Migration continues to be the decisive political topic across Europe. Italy's populist government turns away migrant boats- "[the boat] can go anywhere, but not Italy". Germany Chlr Merkel, having faced huge internal pressure to deal with the migration crisis within her own country, called the EU's current 'Dublin system' for dealing with asylum seekers as "not functional" and hailed a joint "European solution" as the only answer. German media reported that during an informal meeting with new Spain PM Sanchez, Merkel was close to an agreement for migrant repatriation between the two countries and will try to arrange the same with Greece and Italy. While this is a huge political coup for Mutti, her Bavarian allies have taken a beating. We are now two months away from the key state elections. A new poll from RTL and Forza sees both the establishment CSU and SPD parties down 8-10 pct pts. The Greens are up 8 pct pts, and anti-establishment, anti-migration party AfD (who did not compete 5 years ago) enter the poll at 13%. Although 28% of voters see migrants as "a problem affecting the region", 38% named the CSU as the bigger problem. Migrants are the scapegoat for general disaffection with the establishment. Until there is a clear political remedy, the continent will continue its move towards populism.


